INTRODUCTION

The Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) requires programs to report information pertaining to outcomes, program evaluation, and programmatic changes annually and made publicly available.

The Southeastern University Counseling Program conducted its annual faculty review in March 2025, following the structured evaluation process outlined in the Comprehensive Evaluation Plan. This review aimed to assess student performance, program effectiveness, and areas for improvement. Faculty analyzed various data points, including key performance indicators (KPIs), professional counseling performance evaluations (PCPE), student course evaluations, and external advisory feedback. The following report summarizes the key findings and recommendations from the review.

Mission

Our mission in the Southeastern University Counselor Education Program is to educate and prepare competent professional counselors from diverse backgrounds to advance the profession through practice, scholarship, research, leadership, advocacy, and service. SEU faculty desire to inspire qualities of the mind, heart and soul that will prepare students to reach their full potential. Programatic Changes & Modifications





Academic Quality Indicators

Faculty reviewed student performance against Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) to assess alignment with program objectives. The primary areas of concern included:

- KPI 5: Identified as a gap, with the first assessment scheduled for Spring 2026.
- KPI 6: Only 2 of 13 students passed. Faculty recommended a more selective screening and interview process.
- KPI 9: Performance was below expectations (15 of 25 students passed). Faculty identified that the same cohort caused lower scores for KPI 6 and KPI 9.
- KPI 10: Several summer practicum students failed and subsequently dropped the program.
- Overall KPI Performance: Strong in other areas, but faculty emphasized the need for continuous evaluation and refinement.

Action Plan: Faculty will enhance screening and interview procedures, improve faculty engagement in student evaluations, and revise the assessment process for underperforming KPIs.



Professional Counseling Performance Evaluation

Students received PCPE evaluations during Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 residency sessions. Key observations included:

- Multicultural Competency Challenges: Some students demonstrated resistance to working with diverse populations, including LGBTQ+ clients. Faculty recommended additional training in residency and skills exercises.
- Attendance and Participation: Issues were identified in reporting, with incorrect data entry requiring correction.

Programatic Changes & Modifications





Professional Counseling Performance Evaluation

- Appearance and Grooming: Summer 2024 outlier cases were identified and addressed through site supervisor interventions.
- Wellness Support: Some students in practicum required personal counseling. Faculty implemented remediation plans and emphasized wellness in residency.

Action Plan: Faculty will integrate targeted multicultural competency training and case

conceptualization video assessments into future PCPE evaluations.



Practicum and Internship Evaluations

Feedback from site supervisors highlighted:

- The need for improved faculty engagement and oversight.
- The importance of additional support mechanisms for students struggling with practical applications.

Action Plan: Faculty will refine the practicum and internship structure and introduce more support strategies, including increased faculty presence in evaluations.



Community Advisory Committee Review

Faculty reviewed external feedback to align the program with professional trends. Key updates included:

- Ensuring compliance with CACREP residency requirements.
- Enhancing tracking of student enrollment and retention data.
- Developing adjunct and affiliate faculty orientation programs.

Action Plan: Faculty will continue refining curriculum updates and tracking mechanisms to align with industry standards.

Alumni Success and Employment Data

Alumni tracking data showed:

- 50% of students graduated within eight semesters.
- 25% of students are still in progress.

Action Plan: Faculty will continue monitoring alumni success rates and making data-driven curriculum adjustments.



Aggregate Data and Trend Analysis

The faculty conducted a comprehensive review of long-term student success trends:

- Overall performance data indicates program stability and effectiveness.
- The CACREP accreditation submission is in a strong position.

Action Plan: Faculty will continue tracking data and refining strategies to maintain accreditation and program excellence.



Conclusion

The annual faculty review for the Southeastern University Graduate Counseling Program demonstrated a commitment to continuous improvement and student success. While the program has strong areas, including student engagement in helping relationships and strong CACREP alignment, targeted improvements in KPIs, multicultural competencies, and research skills are necessary. The faculty will implement structured action plans to address these areas, ensuring the program remains dynamic, effective, and aligned with accreditation standards.
